Monday, April 1, 2013

Board of Equalization and Review Meeting(s)

Linda Basnight, Tax Administrator, convened the Board of Equalization and Review meeting at 4:00 p.m. on Monday, April 1, 2013 to hear appeals from individual taxpayers as to the value of their property. The meeting was recessed and will reconvene on April 15, 2013 at 6:00 p.m. in the Hyde County Government Center, Multi-Use Room, and the Ocracoke School Commons Room using electronic conferencing equipment.

Board of Commissioners Meeting

Immediately following the Board of Equalization and Review meeting, Chairman Barry Swindell called the Regular Meeting of the Hyde County Board of Commissioners to order at 6:00 p.m. on Monday, April 1, 2013 in the Hyde County Government Center, Multi-Use Room, and the Ocracoke School Commons Room using electronic conferencing equipment.

Following opening prayer by Commissioner Byrd and pledge of allegiance, the meeting was called to order.

Government Center and Public Safety Center Renovations

Andy Lamm and Robin Jinsen of Lamm Engineering Associates, PLLC (LEA) presented a consolidated analysis of evaluated costs and recommendations for replacement of the roof structure on the Public Safety Center (PSC) building, interior upfits to the PSC, a new parking lot for the PSC site, adding asphalt pavement to the Public Health facility parking lot as well as the Public Utilities parking lot; and, roof renovations to the Government Center (GC) to eliminate drainage issues and continued interior damage.

Consolidated Cost Report was provided to the commissioners to summarize all of the project fees for design, inspection and unforeseen contingencies.

Project 1 – The PSC building has three parts – The roof and HVAC design, the interior upfits, and the site improvements. The total cost for this project, complete with all ancillary aspects is approximately \$889,507.00.

Project 2 – Paving of the existing parking is \$71,512.00.

Taken together, the PSC building project and the additional paving is estimated at approximately \$961,019.00.

Project 3 – The GC building roof improvements totals approximately \$190,500.00.

As a complete package, all three projects together are estimated to require approximately \$1,151,519.00.

After discussion, Chairman Swindell reported that final decision to complete one or all of the projects is pending BB&T Loan refinancing of the Government Center and Public Safety Center loans. No action taken at this time.

NCDOT Utility Relocation Agreement

Clint Berry, Utilities Director, presented Utility Relocation Agreement – NC State Highway Project No. 17BP.1.R.50. NCDOT will submit a project for construction of 316 LF of directionally drilled

8" HDPE water line to avoid bridge replacement and relocation of two services and reconnection of one service along Piney Woods Road (SR1305). Mr. Berry reported that NCDOT will pay the cost (\$29,500.00) of relocation of existing waterline around bridge and reconnection and relocation of services. County Attorney Fred Holscher has reviewed and approves the NCDOT Agreement.

Commissioner Byrd moved to approve the NCDOT Utility Relocation Agreement as presented. Mr. Fletcher seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

Ocracoke Convenience Site Update (Chipping Vegetative Debris)

Clint Berry, Utilities Director, reported that on February 26, 2013 the Ocracoke Convenience Site was inspected by NCDENR; and, he was notified that Hyde County is not permitted for the chipper at this site.

On March 15, 2013, Solid Waste Supervisor James Blount was contacted by Mr. Ray Williams, NCDENR Environmental Senior Specialist, and advised that by grinding vegetative waste at the Hyde County Convenience Site the County would be required to apply for a permit to operate a Treatment & Processing (T&P) Facility. 15A NCAC 13B.0201 (a) states: "No person shall treat, process...solid waste except at a solid waste management facility permitted by the Division for such activity..." Providing a roll off container at the site for the collection and transfer of vegetative waste at the convenience site would not require a permit, however, when the County collects and grinds material on-site, it has by definition established a Treatment & Processing Facility at the site without a permit. Also, the site in question would not meet the buffer requirements for operating a T&P, so another site would need to be found that met the buffer requirements if Hyde County wishes to continue operating the grinder.

Pursuant to N.C.G.S. 130A-22, an administrative penalty of up to \$15,000.00 per day may be assessed for each violation of the Solid Waste Statute or Regulations. For any violation(s), the property owner or site operator may be subject to enforcement actions including penalties, injunction from operation of a solid waste management facility or a solid waste collection service, and any such further relief as may be necessary to achieve compliance with the NC Solid Waste Management Act and Rules. A violator has 30 days to take measures to correct the violation(s) found on/at the solid waste management site.

Clint Berry, Utilities Director, was instructed to investigate options to resolve the Ocracoke Convenience Site chipper issue and to report his finding at the May 6, 2013 Board of Commissioners meeting. The Board will receive recommendations and take action at that time.

Facility Fee Schedule – Primary Care Services Through Telemedicine

Wesley Smith, Health Director, reported that at the quarterly meeting held on March 19, 2013 the Hyde County Board of Health approved a Facility Fee Schedule for clients seen for primary care services via telemedicine, effective February 26, 2013. The standard facility fee has been established at \$50.00 per visit, with an introductory facility fee of \$10.00 through August 2013. The Health Department is currently a participating provider with Medicaid and Blue Cross/Blue Shield of North Carolina, and is in the process of becoming credentialed to participate in Medicare and MedCost (County of Hyde). Local health departments must receive approval of both the Board of Health and Board of County Commissioners for new or revised fee schedules.

Commissioner Fletcher moved to approve Facility Fee Schedule for Primary Care Services through Telemedicine. Mr. Pugh seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

Ocracoke Occupancy Tax

County Manager Rich reported that during their February 27, 2013 Board meeting the Ocracoke Occupancy Tax Board voted to allocate \$30,000.00 for advertising in April and May.

Commissioner Fletcher moved to approve the Ocracoke Occupancy Tax Board allocation of funds for advertising (\$15,000.00 in April and \$15,000.00 in May). Mr. Tunnell seconded the motion.

The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

Revolving Loan Fund Request

Kris Noble, Planning Director, presented request for \$84,000.00 loan from the Revolving Loan Fund to Leland and Everett Hershey owners of Precision Pallet, LLC, 405 Main Stem Road, Pantego, NC 27860. Precision Pallet, LLC will purchase a biomass kiln.

A driving force in the pallet industry at this time is the presence of mold on shipping pallets. Companies involved in shipping food, pharmaceuticals and seed are choosing pallet companies that can ensure the pallets are mold free. Precision Pallet intends to stay ahead of the needs of the industry by drying the pallets thoroughly in a kiln. Currently, Precision Pallet has one propane kiln which is limited in capacity and expensive to operate. In order to meet the needs of a current customer that represents approximately 46% of Precision Pallet's sales, the company will install and operate a biomass kiln. The kiln will be more efficient to operate because it will be fueled by biomass waste that the company produces on site.

Ms. Noble reported that Precision Pallet, LLC has 20 employees and most live in Hyde County.

Commissioner Fletcher moved to approve a Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) loan to Leland B. Hershey and Everett D. Hershey, Precision Pallet, LLC, in the amount of \$84,000.00 with a five (5) year term at 5% interest. Mr. Pugh seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

GRTS Teaming Agreement – Airport Project

Kris Noble, Planning Director, reported Hyde County has been asked to enter into a Teaming Agreement with North Carolina State University (NCSU) on behalf of the NextGen Air Transportation Center (NCAT) in order that they move forward with the Unmanned Aerial Project's Gull Rock Test Site Project.

Fred Holscher, County Attorney, and Manager Rich reported the agreement is too restrictive and they do not recommend entering into the Teaming Agreement.

Commissioner Fletcher moved to table discussion on the NCSU Teaming Agreement. Mr. Pugh seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

CenturyLink – Telephone System

On March 4, 2013 the Board authorized County Manager Bill Rich to select which option to approve and to sign maintenance coverage documents with CenturyLink.

Manager Rich reported that he entered into Voice and Data Upgrade Agreement with CenturyLink. Hyde County must buyout old equipment totaling \$42,000.00. Currently the County pays \$13,885.85 per month for services. Under the new agreement the County will lease the equipment and CenturyLink will service it. Hyde County will pay \$10,000.00 per month. Mr. Rich reported that Department of Social Services Pass-through Funds will offset the monthly costs.

No action required.

Commissioner Fletcher requested research on how many cell phones the County pays for and who has them. Manager Rich will report his findings at the next regularly scheduled Board of Commissioners meeting on May 6, 2013.

Amendment of Rules of Procedures for The Hyde County Board of Commissioners

After discussion, Commissioner Fletcher moved to approve the final amended version of "Rules of Procedures for The Hyde County Board of Commissioners." Mr. Pugh seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

Renewal of Compensation Agreements for Emergency Use of Non-County Owned Facilities

Manager Rich presented request to renew compensation agreements for the emergency use of the following non-county owned facilities: 1) Mattamuskeet Fresh Produce, Inc., 2) Ocracoke School Complex, and 3) Ocracoke Variety Store.

“Emergency Use” is defined as the use of the facility during a locally declared state of emergency as an Emergency Operations Center, Community Disaster Facility, Disaster Supply Staging Area, Base Camp or other usage approved jointly by the facility manager and the Hyde County Emergency Operations Center. Under this agreement the County will have first priority for emergency use of the facility, the facility managers will have second priority, and third parties will have tertiary priority as allowed by the emergency operations being conducted by the County at these facilities.

Commissioner Fletcher moved to renew compensation agreements for the emergency use of facilities with Mattamuskeet Fresh Produce, Inc., Ocracoke School Complex and Ocracoke Variety Store; and to authorize the County Manager to execute the compensation agreements. Mr. Byrd seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

Commissioner Fletcher requested research on increasing the term of the Compensation Agreements from two years up to three to five years with a 1% increase each year. Manager Rich will report his findings at the next regularly scheduled Board of Commissioners meeting on May 6, 2013.

Spending Freeze

After discussion, Commissioner Byrd moved to set a spending freeze for all County departments through the end of Fiscal Year 2012-2013 effective April 15; and, to authorize Manager Rich to approve requests over \$100.00 as he deems necessary. Mr. Fletcher seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

The Health Department and Department of Social Services will not be affected by the freeze.

FY2013-2014 Budget Calendar

Manager Rich reported that he and Finance Officer Corrinne Gibbs will begin departmental budget discussions on Tuesday, April 2, 2013.

Manager Rich and Finance Officer Gibbs will present the draft FY2013-2014 Hyde County Budget at the next regularly scheduled Board of Commissioners meeting on May 6, 2013.

Special Meeting of the Hyde County Board of Commissioners will be held on Tuesday, May 7, 2013 for the purpose of FY2013-2014 Budget discussion.

Commissioner Pugh moved to hold Public Hearing on the FY2013-2014 Hyde County Budget on Monday, June 3, 2013, beginning at 6:00 p.m., in the Hyde County Government Center, Multi-Use Room, and the Ocracoke School Commons Room using electronic conferencing equipment. Mr. Byrd seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Tunnell and Swindell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

Commissioner Byrd moved to come out of closed session at 7:45 p.m. Mr. Fletcher seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Swindell and Tunnell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

Manager Rich reported that Vantage South Bank has made a “good will” offer to give the East Carolina Bank Processing Building in Engelhard to Hyde County. Mr. Rich reported the 11,500 sq. ft. building has 51 offices and is a state of the art facility. He will work with Utilities Director Clint Berry to assess the building. Commissioners and department heads are invited to tour the facility.

Reports:

Commissioner Tunnell – reported that he the Highway 12 and Ferry Toll meetings on Ocracoke; Mid-East Housing meeting; Hyde County Recreation Committee meeting; and, LPAN meeting with the Health Department.

Commissioner Byrd – reported that he also attended the Highway 12 and Ferry Toll meetings on Ocracoke and that he spoke with Mr. Shoemaker, Governor Pat McCrory’s personal assistant, about both issues. Mr. Byrd reported that NCWR has requested authority to control permit baiting which will take permitting out of Legislative hands. He also reported that the Legislature is going to pass legislation approving Sunday hunting.

Manager Rich was instructed to draft resolutions supporting NCWR control of permit baiting but opposing Sunday hunting in Hyde County.

Commissioner Fletcher – reported that he has been contacted by many Ocracoke citizens about the chipper and front end loader at the Ocracoke Convenience Site.

Commissioner Pugh – reported that he attended “Coffee with Experts” at Mattamuskeet Senior Center; Chamber of Commerce Annual Meeting; Highway 12 and Ferry Toll meetings on Ocracoke; and, the Albemarle Commission meeting.

Chairman Swindell – reported that he also attended the Health Department training. Mr. Swindell discussed water meter issues that had been reported to him.

After discussion, Commissioner Swindell moved to adjust water bills for John Bull and Allen Ballance to a rate of three (3) times the normal monthly rate; and, directed County Manager Rich to draft a letter to Tideland EMC and to call Paul Spruill, Tideland EMC, CEO & General Manager, to discuss Tideland’s responsibility for damages caused by Mastec while contracted by Tideland.

Mr. Byrd seconded the motion. The motion passed on the following vote: Ayes – Byrd, Fletcher, Pugh, Swindell and Tunnell; Nays – None; Absent or not voting – None.

County Manager Rich – reported Deputy Clerk/PIO Megan Shaw had resigned her position with Hyde County. Mr. Rich thanked Megan for work done and thanked Assistant Clerk Rachel Cobb for operating the electronic equipment on Ocracoke. The position was posted and Sarah Johnson of Ocracoke was hired to fill a position as Deputy Clerk/PIO. Sarah will work up to 20 hours per week at \$10.00 per hour.

Mr. Rich attended the Highway 12 and Ferry Toll meetings on Ocracoke and in Pamlico County; met with Lamm Engineering to review Government Center and Public Safety Center repairs proposals; addressed issues of derelict boats on Silver Lake; presented update on the Unmanned Aircraft Project, BB&T Loan, Friends of the Courthouse meeting and Ocracoke Community Square Project meetings.

Public Comments:

Chairman Swindell called for comments from the public.

Darlene Styron, Ocracoke – stated that three containers at the Ocracoke Convenience Site will not be enough.

There being no further comments from the public, Chairman Swindell continued the meeting.

Adjourn





WHEREAS, these new requirements have to be implemented by October 2013; and







Resolution Supporting H.R. 819 Preserving Access To The Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area Act

WHEREAS, H.R. 819 introduced by Congressman Walter Jones (NC-3) to preserve access to the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area, reintroduces a previous bill that passed the House of Representatives in the last Congress but failed it make it out of Senate committee; and,

WHEREAS, H.R. 819 would restore balance and common sense to Park Service management by overturning a final rule implemented by the National Park Service in mid-February 2012, as well as the 2008 U.S. District Court approved Consent Decree, both of which excessively restrict human access to the Recreational Area; and,

WHEREAS, H.R. 819 would assure taxpayers the right to access the recreational areas they own by reinstating the Park Service's 2007 Interim Management Strategy, which was backed up by a 113-page Biological Opinion issued by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service finding that species of concern, including piping plover and sea turtles, would not be jeopardized; and,

WHEREAS, the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area (CHNSRA) was created by Congress in 1937 as America's first National Seashore with the promise that people would always have access for recreation; and,

WHEREAS, a tourism based economy has been developed on Bodie Island, Hatteras Island and Ocracoke Island, where access to the beaches of this area has always been the defining element of the visitor's complete seashore experience and the foundation of the area's economic base upon which thousands of families depend for their livelihood; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Hyde County Board of Commissioners supports open public access to the Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreational Area consistent with the promises made in the enabling legislation and supports H.R. 819 as effective legislation that would balance resource management with recreational access for Dare and Hyde County residents and visitors.


WHEREAS, Museum of the Albemarle has become a vital resource for our area.



Resolution Expressing Concern for the Governor's 2013-14 Budget Proposal in Regard to the N.C. Rural Economic Development Center, the Golden LEAF Foundation and the NCCAT Center

WHEREAS, Governor McCrory released a budget proposal for 2013-14 that threatens the pace of economic recovery in North Carolina's 85 rural counties;

WHEREAS, the proposed 2013-14 budget calls for a reduction of \$10 million in the appropriation to the N.C. Rural Economic Development Center which will decrease funds for rural projects by more than 60 percent; eliminate the potential for creating 2,000 new jobs in the next year and every year that the reduction continues; and drastically limit the Center's ability to serve the needs of rural N.C. counties;

WHEREAS, the proposed 2013-14 budget diverts all of the funds that the Golden LEAF Foundation would normally receive beginning in April 2014 and thereafter which will restrict Golden LEAF's ability to help grow the N.C. economy;

WHEREAS, the proposed 2013-14 budget diverts all annual state funding to the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching housed on both Ocracoke Island and Cullowhee, N.C., resulting in the closing of both facilities;

WHEREAS, the N.C. Rural Economic Development Center has contributed grant funds to Hyde County for projects including but not limited to the creation and construction of the Swan Quarter and Engelhard Sanitary Districts, the Engelhard Water Plant, the reconstruction of the Historic Courthouse and other Swan Quarter Revitalization projects through the Small Towns Economic Prosperity Program, the creation of the e-NC Public Access Site, and the saving of the last fish house on Ocracoke Island;

WHEREAS, the N.C. Rural Economic Development Center has provided the basis for enhancing community leadership and knowledge by training Hyde County staff to successfully apply for grant funds, monitor engineering firms, stay compliant with state and federal regulations, and train community leaders through the Rural Economic Development Leadership Program;

WHEREAS, the Golden LEAF Foundation has contributed grant funds to Hyde County for projects including but not limited to the construction of the Engelhard Marine Industrial Park building, engineering and design for sewer projects, saving the last fish house on Ocracoke Island, construction of the Engelhard Medical Center; and contributed grant funds to partners such as NC State University to support Unmanned Aerial Vehicle testing at the Engelhard Airport and to NC CATCH to support the promotion of fresh local seafood from Hyde County and other NC coastal counties;

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching has a vision to help every N.C. teacher grow in knowledge, skills, compassion, and professionalism so that every student becomes engaged, self-motivated and successful;

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching helps to retain the most caring, highly qualified, and skilled teachers necessary to positively impact the quality of public education in North Carolina;

WHEREAS, the closing of the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching's fully renovated campus on Ocracoke Island would result in job loss, loss of indirect economic benefit, and the closing of one of N.C.'s coastal landmarks;





Whereas, public policies that support early learning for all young children are crucial to young children's futures;



**PROCLAMATION
PUBLIC HEALTH MONTH
APRIL 2013**

WHEREAS, we hereby recognize and acknowledge public health's 132 years of service to the residents of North Carolina and the immeasurable contribution of these services to the quality of life in our State; and

WHEREAS, North Carolina's public health system is a critical component of the state's emergency response to natural and man-made disasters and widespread disease outbreaks in North Carolina; and

WHEREAS, public health measures to control and eliminate infectious diseases, improve environmental sanitation, and promote healthy lifestyle practices have been the greatest cause of improved health status and increased life expectancy for North Carolina's residents, such that North Carolinians now have an average life expectancy at birth of more than 80 years; and

WHEREAS, public health plays a critical role in eliminating health inequities and preventing chronic diseases and injuries, resulting in improved productivity and decreased health care costs for all North Carolinians; and

WHEREAS, a continued focus on promoting public health programs that provide accessible, high quality medical care and that promote healthy lifestyles for women of childbearing has resulted in a more than 11 percent decline in infant mortality, the lowest rate in the state's history; and

WHEREAS, a continued focus on prevention has resulted in a more than 29 percent decline in age-adjusted heart disease death rates since 2000, a more than 38 percent decline in age-adjusted stroke death rates since 2000, and an almost 35 percent decline in the teen pregnancy rate since 2000; and

WHEREAS, state government is committed to a continued emphasis on prevention in Public Health and helping North Carolina reach a better state of health through actions outlined in the Healthy North Carolina 2020 Objectives; and

WHEREAS, the Healthy North Carolina 2020 health objectives represent a 10-year plan to improve the health of all North Carolinians by working to promote access to preventive and needed health services; foster positive and supportive living and working conditions in our communities; and support individuals in developing the capacities and skills to achieve healthy living; and

WHEREAS, communities, employers, hospitals and health care providers, individuals and families, insurers, legislators and policy makers, schools and child care facilities must work together to identify and develop innovative solutions to health problems facing the people of North Carolina;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Hyde County Board of Commissioners do hereby proclaim April 2013 as "PUBLIC HEALTH MONTH," and urge our citizens to recognize that public health is working to ensure that all people living in Hyde County are protected from threats such as influenza, food borne disease, injury and chronic diseases such as diabetes, heart disease and asthma.
