ORGANIZATION

The District is a governmental subdivision of the State, a public body corporate and politic, organized in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 139 of the General Statutes of North Carolina and is subject to the powers and restrictions as set forth in G.S. 139. Under this law, the District has the responsibility of conserving soil, water, and related natural resources within the District boundary. (When districts were first organized in 1937, their main responsibility was the control of soil erosion caused by water and wind.) The District board is made up of five supervisors: three elected (J.W. Spencer, Daren Hubers and Darren Armstrong) and two appointed (Earl O'Neal and Chad Spencer). The Board meets monthly to handle current business and stay up to date on environmental matters.

Annual and long-range programs of conservation and development within the District boundaries are developed and carried out with the assistance of local, state, and federal agencies. The Long-Range Program and Work Plan was updated in 2013. The North Carolina Agriculture Cost Share Program (initiated in 1984 as a pilot program and gradually extended to all counties) has been a great initiative to encourage landowners and landusers to apply best management practices (BMPs). The USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service, working through a Mutual Agreement, is a major source of assistance. This agreement enables the District to furnish technical service to individuals, groups, and other agencies and units of government.

DISTRICT SERVICES

The public is encouraged to use the assistance provided on request through the Hyde Soil and Water Conservation District. Assistance is generally provided without charge and without regard to race, color, sex, age, religion or national origin. The Hyde SWCD, with the assistance from USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service, offers county residents/landowners the following:



Celebrating 100 Years



HYDE COUNTY WATER SYSTEM

We're very pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Quality Water Report. We want to keep you informed about the water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. I'm pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets Federal and State requirements.

What EPA Wants You to Know

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline 1-800-426-4791.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water

which must provide the same protection from public health. All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by substances that are naturally occurring or man made. These substances can be microbes, inorganic or organic chemicals, and radioactive substances. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk.

WHERE DOES MY WATER COME FROM?

The water that we provide to our customers comes from three separate locations in the county. The first location is the Ponzer area just off Highway 45, where our water sources are two deep wells which draw from the Castle Hayne Aquifer. The second location is the Fairfield area just off SR 1305, where our water sources are two shallow wells which draw from the Yorktown Aquifer and the third location is in Engelhard where our sources are two wells that draw water from the Yorktown Aquifer.

HOW IS MY WATER TREATED AND PURIFIED?

All the water from the Hyde County Water System is treated with three state of the art Reverse Osmosis water plants. The treatment process (in general) consists of pumping water from the wells through a set of 5 micron cartridge filters. Then a R/O booster pump forces the water through an array of semipermeable membranes. The R/O unit rejects 98% of all minerals and

recovers 75% of all the water that passes through the unit. The water is then aerated, chlorinated, and pH balanced before pumping to sanitized ground storage tanks, elevated tanks, and into your home or business. **WATER QUALITY DATA
TABLE of DETECTED
CONTAMINANTS**

We routinely monitor for over 120 contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The table below lists all the drinking water contaminants that we *detected* in the last round of sampling for the particular contaminant group. The presence of contaminants does *not* necessarily indicate

that water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1—December 31, 2013. The EPA or the State requires it to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. Some of the data, though representative of the water quality, is more than one year old.

The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive materials, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife; inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming; pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses; organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems; and radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Important Drinking Water Definitions:

Not-Applicable (N/A) – information not applicable/ not required for that particular water system or for that particular Rule.

Non-Detects (ND) – laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present at the level of detection set of the particular methodology used.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) – one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years, or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter – one part per billion corresponds to the minute in 2000 years, or in a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Maximum Contaminant Level – The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal – The "Goal" (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health, MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Million Fibers per Liter (MFL) - Million fibers per liter is a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.

Child Support Services
May 2014

Administrative enforcement processes include a variety of collection remedies for the child support program. There are administrative liens, which we use frequently to attach to worker's compensation or other insurance settlements, bank account liens, tax intercept, and income withholding.

Income withholding serves to be the most productive of these remedies, and over the years, income withholding has become a much easier process. Several years ago income withholding notices were mailed certified mail to employers, and had to be calculated by manually prior to mailing. Now, income withholdings can be mailed regular mail, thus reducing the cost of postage, and are automated through the ACTS system. When employment information is entered in ACTS, the system will calculate the withholding worksheet and generate the withholding documents. Also, income withholdings to unemployment used to be mailed in to Raleigh on a special form. Currently, ACTS has an interface with the Division of Employment Security, allowing income withholdings to process electronically between the two systems. These changes have increased productivity for the worker, allowing income withholding payments to be collected much faster than in previous years. On an average month, the Child Support office mails out over 48 wage withholdings to various employers.

Income withholdings generate the largest percentage of overall collections for all three counties. In Washington County, income withholdings make up 57.3% of the total collections this year. Likewise, in Tyrrell County income withholding payments comprise 55.5% of the total collections. And, last but not least, in Hyde County collections are comprised of 54.3% income withholding payments.

During the 25 days before the election, our system is locked and does not allow for changes to voter records. It is also locked for several days after the election until the election is finalized. Therefore, our reports that we process each month are put on hold during this timeframe. Most of the processing that is done during this timeframe is Election Day changes.

RECREATION UPDATE

Hyde County Recreation Committee Update:

In 2012, after many requests from Hyde County residents, the Hyde County Board of Commissioners regenerated the Hyde County Recreation Committee. Two members were chosen from each township by their respective Commissioner to serve on the committee. After a series of meetings, the Recreation Committee finalized revisions of the by-laws and ordinance governing the committee, organized the terms of each member, as well as choosing members to serve as Chair and Vice-Chair.

In March, 2014, committee member Ben Simmons was appointed to fill the County Commissioner seat vacated by the late Anson Byrd of Fairfield Township. As Commissioner, Mr. Simmons nominated Nick Russ to fill his seat on the Recreation Committee. In April, 2014, Ron Gabriel, who previously served as the Chair of the Recreation Committee, resigned from the committee, leaving a vacancy for the Engelhard Township. The Recreation Committee will meet again on **June 4, 2014** at 6:00 p.m. to recommend a new member from Engelhard to the Board of Commissioners for appointment, as well as name a new committee Chair. The Board of Commissioners will approve this new appointment at their July 7, 2014 regular meeting.

Recreation Master Plan Update:

In 2013, Hyde County received grant funds from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, North Carolina Division of Public Health, Region 9 Community Transformation Grant Project's Strategic Leadership Team, and Region 9's Active Living Action Team in the amount of \$12,000 from the Region 9 Community Transformation Grant Project in 2013 for the revision of Hyde County's Recreation and Parks Master Plan.

Funding for this project is going towards consultant contractual services for plan preparation aligned with the proposal's identified program expenses. The original 2002 Recreation & Parks Master Plan for Hyde County and the corresponding Recreation Committee lead to several valuable projects to promote recreation, including the Ponzer Community Building and the Engelhard Development Corporation's park and walking trail.

In October 2013, the Hyde County Office of Planning and Economic Development Department advertised a Request for Qualifications for the update of the Hyde County Recreation & Parks Master Plan. Hyde County contracted with Holland Consulting Planners (HCP) to work on the Plan's update. Wes MacLeod, Urban and Regional Planner with HCP, has been working Hyde County's

Recreation Committee as well as the Office of Planning and Economic Development for the update of the plan. The updated plan will include a comprehensive report of existing recreational facilities, parks and programs, and will include recommendations for meeting both short and long term recreational needs of county residents.

Public meetings were held in Ocracoke and on the Mainland in early 2014 to gather public input on the plan. A survey was distributed to all students at Ocracoke and Mattamuskeet Schools, as well as made available online for other residents. The results of these surveys will be included in the update plan. An asset condition ranking is being completed and will provide an overview of conditions for the existing facilities available for recreational use in Hyde County.

The final draft of the Hyde County Recreation and Parks Master Plan is scheduled to be ready by May 30. The Hyde County Recreation Committee will hold a special meeting June 4, 2014 to review and make any changes necessary to the plan before adoption. If adopted by the Recreation Committee on June 4th, the plan will be presented to the Hyde County Board of Commissioners at the July 7, 2014 regular meeting.

Talking Points for Ocracoke Inlet

- There are currently no markers in Ocracoke Inlet excepting the day buoy that is approximately 3/4 of a mile off course.
- Over the last three years the buoys have been moved and/or washed ashore.
- 2014 is the first year the buoys have been almost completely out of existence. A vessel with less than a 4 foot draw currently kicks sand in the inlet.
- The last physical marker is #13 the last light is #16. In traveling from marker #13 to marker #16 a captain would encounter 3 sand bars.
- These off station buoys are even more dangerous than those out of existence because mariners trust them for navigational aids.
- An inlet survey must be completed by the USCG.
- After a survey the USCG should move the day marker to stay in the channel and then the gaps must be filled in. Markers 20 and 20A are critical as they mark the point to turn towards Ocracoke Inlet.
- This situation requires immediate attention as it is a Public Safety crisis, greatly effects tourism and transportation.
- This is not simply an Ocracoke issue; it is a North Carolina issue. This is the last open access to the Atlantic Ocean from the Outer Banks as the Hatteras and Oregon inlets have filled in.
- The inaccessibility to the ocean from the inlets is crippling both the commercial and recreational fishing industry and hindering tourism efforts.

Supreme Court upholds prayer opening for local government board meetings

Susan Galloway and Linda Stephens attended Town Board meetings in Greece, N.Y. to speak about local issues. When they objected to the prayers that opened the meetings because the invocations violated

their religious or philosophical beliefs, town officials suggested they stand in the hall until the prayers ended. Instead, they sued the Town of Greece claiming that its prayer practices violated the First Amendment's Establishment Clause.

In a highly publicized decision, the U.S. Supreme Court held 5-4 that the Town of Greece did not violate the First Amendment by opening its meetings with a prayer. The court's decision in *Town of Greece v. Galloway* provides a roadmap of warnings counties can follow to stay out of trouble when beginning county government meetings with a prayer.

While anyone could offer a prayer at a Town of Greece board meeting, from 1999-2007, all those who offered prayers were Christian. Some referred to Jesus in their prayers. The town recruited "board chaplains" from a local directory, but nearly all congregations were Christian. An important note: Clergy crafted their own messages without any input from the town.

In their lawsuit, Galloway and Stephens argued that legislative prayer couldn't contain sectarian language or themes such as the

"death, resurrection, and ascension of the Savior Jesus Christ." They also argued that prayers before Town Board meetings "create social pressures that force non-adherents to remain in the room or even feign participation in order to avoid offending the representatives who sponsor the prayer and will vote on matters citizens bring before the board." Justice Anthony Kennedy's majority opinion rejected both arguments.

The court also rejected an argument that a previous decision on "legislative" prayer, in *Marsh*

v. Chambers, only allowed non-sectarian prayer. Only allowing nonsectarian prayer would require local governments to "act as supervisors and censors of religious speech" and it isn't clear when a prayer is sectarian.

The court warned, however, that sectarian prayers can go too far "[i]f the course and practice over time shows that the invocations denigrate nonbelievers or religious minorities, threaten damnation, or preach conversion."

The court also warned that coercion could be possible "if town board members directed the public to participate in the prayers, singled

out dissidents for opprobrium, or indicated that their decisions might be influenced by a person's acquiescence in the prayer opportunity."

It is noteworthy that this decision will have the biggest impact in the 2nd Circuit (Connecticut, New York and Vermont) and the 4th Circuit (Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina). The 2nd Circuit had declared Greece's prayer practice unconstitutional focusing on the Christian nature of most of the prayers. The 4th Circuit in 2011 had ruled that only nonsectarian prayer at local board meetings is constitutional.

Justices Clarence Thomas and Antonin Scalia didn't join the court's coercion analysis but joined the court's judgment. They said that First Amendment coercion exists only "by force of law and threat of penalty." The court's so-called liberal justices dissented: Justice Elena Kagan's opinion was joined by Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg

Dear County Manager Rich and Members of the Hyde County Board of Commissioners,

The attached budget request for local revenue is being submitted to the Hyde County Manager and Board of Commissioners. The local revenue budget was approved by the Hyde County Board of Education at its meeting on April 1, 2014. The request for funding from local revenue does reflect a restoration of local revenue to the 2009 appropriation. The needs of the public schools of Hyde County are not diminishing. The Board recognizes and understands the constraints of the local Board of Commissioners as it struggles to leverage all resources to meet the growing needs of the county in the midst of decreased revenue streams as it works to maintain a high quality level of services for all stakeholders. The budget from local revenue is crucial in assisting the Hyde County Board of Education in meeting the educational needs of the six hundred twenty-nine students enrolled in the schools in grades PreK -13.

The Board and its employees continue to work to reduce costs. Unfortunately, the overwhelming majority of the budget goes to payroll and associated cost. Beginning in 2010, the Board of Education began to look very critically at its payroll cost and during that year, one position was eliminated. In light of continued reduced funding from federal, state, and local sources, the Board, upon recommendation by the Superintendent, will have downsized its regular payroll by thirty-four positions from 2010 to June 30, 2014, the end of the current school year.

It is important to note that local revenue is not used to the salary of associated costs for teachers. All of the teachers are accounted for through state or federal sources. Personnel costs for the maintenance department and an employee in the human resources department are directly tied to local revenue. The Finance Officer will review and discuss the local budget allocation by areas when he presents the local revenue budget request.

The local revenue budget request for the current year is \$1,199,568. The local revenue budget request for the next school year is \$1,424,568. The Board requests the restoration of revenue to the level that was allocated in 2009...that being \$1,424,568. The Board of Commissioners reduced local funding in the 2010, 2011, 2013 budget years to its current level of \$1,199,568. As you recall, the Board of Commissioners made a one-time allocation of \$48,015 to bring the County up to the minimum per child local expenditure of \$2,173.49. As of now, the preliminary planning allotment sheet from NC DPI does not reflect any appropriation for Low Wealth funding. However, as we plan for the upcoming year, we will receive updates to the planning allotment sheet.

Unfortunately, the planning allotment sheet does reflect and additional decrease in Small County Supplemental Funding in the amount of \$332,532.00. This year we received \$1,662,659. Next year we are projected to receive \$1,330,127. The current approved reduction in force does not reflect this potential decrease. If it goes through, additional staff and programs will be eliminated. It is hoped that the approved reduction in Small County Supplemental Funding will not occur.

Mr. Ken Chilcoat will now present the local revenue budget.

COUNTY COMMISSIONER ADVOCATES TO PROTECT AND RESTORE COUNTY SHARE OF LOTTERY PROCEEDS

_____ County Commissioner _____ attended the May 28 County Assembly Day, sponsored by the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners, and helped advocate to restore and protect the county share of proceeds from the North Carolina Education Lottery.

“Restoring the full share of lottery proceeds and the statutes that designate counties as a recipient of lottery funds is our top priority this session,” said NCACC Executive Director David F. Thompson. “We appreciate the support of the hundreds of commissioners who came to County Assembly Day and helped heighten awareness of this issue in the General Assembly. The lottery is the only remaining state-funded support for public school construction.”

Over the past five years, counties have lost more than \$300 million in lottery funds. The Legislature has reduced the county lottery share each of the past four years (see chart). For the current fiscal year, the Legislature appropriated \$100 million – or slightly more than half of what counties would have received – to school construction. In 2013, the Legislature eliminated the statute that directed 40 percent of net lottery funds to school construction.

Total Project	\$100,000.00


Section 5. The Finance Officer is hereby directed to maintain within the Project Fund sufficient specific detailed accounting records.
